During this first week of Advent, our thoughts have naturally turned to Christmastime and it is fair to say that the festive season is in full swing here at Truro School Prep. Both EYFS and Key Stage 1 Nativity performances have taken place and it is clear that there are a considerable number of budding dramatists in our midst. On that note, staging one production in a day is a challenge, presenting two performances within five hours of each other, only to repeat the process the following day is nothing short of miraculous!

Head Lice

We have cases of head lice in school and would very much appreciate your help in trying to eradicate them. Please can you check your child's hair this evening if possible, using the wet comb method, to help us become lice free! Head lice are difficult to find in dry hair, but in wet hair they lose their grip, move more slowly and can be combed out. Regular combing will help to prevent re-infection as it damages the lice and breaks their life cycle.

To avoid using chemical applications, we recommend washing the hair, rinsing and applying a normal conditioner. Comb through the conditioner with an ordinary comb to remove the tangles. Then, using a head lice comb, part the hair into sections. Comb through, starting at the scalp and out to the end of the hair. After each stroke check the comb for lice and rinse or wipe the comb. After combing the entire head, rinse out the conditioner.

To try and limit the spread of head lice we would advise weekly wet-combing as above, maintain long hair in a ponytail or braids, avoid sharing combs/brushes and hair accessories and do not allow head-to-head contact.

Online Safety Section: The Festive Fortnite!

Short days, inclement weather and generous relatives can mean that our children's access to online devices can be less than ideally regulated over the festive period. Technology forms an integral part of many of our children's lives and supporting them as they navigate this digital world can be challenging. It is easy to lose track of the duration of time a child spends gaming or simply watching YouTube videos, as the nature of digital entertainment means there is no clear endpoint to their time online. Combine this with the chance for a parent to ensure they have a happily occupied child over a busy Christmas period, and it is easy to see how the amount of time a child spends online can spin out of control.

[Internet Matters](#) (www.internetmatters.org) offers a wealth of advice and information for parents and professionals across the spectrum of online safety. This includes a section specifically for guidance around screen time and the risks (and benefits); click [here](#) to read more. [This short video](#) also suggests three sensible rules for managing screen use. Finally, [Common Sense Media](#) provides in-depth guidance on the nature of the online games available, detailing areas such as positive role models, ease of play, language and violence; a very useful and highly recommended website for parents seeking to understand more about the games their child is immersed in.

Open discussions, secure parental controls and engagement and interest in a child's online life are key. Although there will inevitably come the plea for "just another five minutes" over this festive period, a good understanding of your child's digital interests combined with a few simple protocols can ensure a healthy balance of screen and family time is maintained.

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The Story of the Candy Cane

Pre-Prep pupils were treated to a surprise guest in the form of Rev Helen, resplendent in a candy cane costume. A traditional part of the Christmas season, the Rev explained the true symbolism of the iconic candy in the Christian faith.

Created over 100 years ago to encompass the essence of Christmas, the candy is sweet like the Baby Jesus, while the shape of it is said to be representative of the crooks carried by the shepherds who visited the baby Jesus, in the Christian faith Jesus is also our Good Shepherd. Held upside down, the shape also forms the letter 'J'.

The red colour is symbolic of the humanity of Christ, while the white is a symbol of his divinity, blended to form one structure.

Pupils certainly enjoyed the assembly and every one took home a candy cane, challenged to tell their families the story behind the treat.

Year One


Pupils have inspected their ladybird hibernation hotels as a survey with [The Buzz Club](#). We found few ladybirds still flying around but they weren't in our houses!






