

15 MARCH 2024: TRURO SCHOOL NEWS AND UPDATES



Dear Parents and Carers,

I will, if I may, start this week's missive with a pop quiz:

Q1. What is the title of the New Radicals' November 1998 single (which also featured in the soundtrack to the movie 'Surf's Up')?

Q2. What is the title of the 2010 Zac Brown Band album?

The answer to both questions is: 'you get what you give'. If you managed to find the right answer, please treat yourself to an extra cup of tea, a slice of cake or a glass of something later this evening.

'You get what you give' has been our focus throughout the week and the term as we have looked at our interactions with others and identified that our actions are returned to us. For instance, a smile leads to another smile and kindness so often leads to more kindness. We have also identified that this works in a similar fashion with less positive emotions: rudeness and unkindness too often result in more of the same.

However, the input and output of such interactions are not always instantaneous or similar. We know that hard work leads to success but it often takes weeks, months, or years to reap the rewards of our efforts. This week's focus has allowed us to look at how our day-to-day work in the classroom, in the music school, in the art department, on the stage, on the sports fields and throughout the activities programme will eventually pay rich dividends. On a similar theme, the kindness, respect and support that we show to our peers and colleagues daily will help us develop long-lasting friendships and relationships.

Continuing on the same theme I have two rather lovely messages to impart. The first is courtesy of the raft of prospective parents who attended our open day last Saturday. In their own words, they were 'blown away by the confidence and kindness that they witnessed' and were particularly impressed by, 'the maturity of the children, their confidence in coming up to engage in conversation and the high expectations they have of themselves and others'.

The second is a simple observation of the children's extraordinary accomplishments that I have witnessed over the past week. I will not detail them all here as the list would be almost endless but I must make mention of fantastic academic work in the classroom, the choir, orchestra and spoken word competitors sweeping the board at the Cornwall Music Festival and some superb performances on the games pitches, cross-country course and in the pool. None of these things happen by chance, but as a result of continued hard work and dedication; the children certainly deserve these plaudits. Of course, my follow-up message was that we cannot afford to sit back and look at this as a job well done or to be complacent in any fashion - there is always room for further improvement and we will continue on this journey together.

This is also a perfect opportunity for me to thank you for your continued support for your children and the school. I thoroughly appreciate that sending your children to Truro School involves a great deal of sacrifice on your part, not to mention the countless car journeys, late evenings and a seemingly endless stream of permission slips and homework tasks. Your efforts are thoroughly appreciated by us here at school and, when they are old enough to truly appreciate it, I do not doubt that your children will feel the same way. In the meantime, take solace from the fact that your children continue to develop into kind, considerate, hard-working and incredibly capable young people.

Finally, you will shortly receive communication from Chris Dove, our Assistant Head Academic. Following several conversations and communications with parents, we have implemented a review of homework across the school. This began with staff, and has moved to the older pupils and you, as parents and carers, are next on our list. I hope that you will be able to contribute.

Truro School has had a fantastic week at this year's Cornwall Music Festival, with a record number of pupils taking part from both the Prep and Senior School.

The week began with a group of extremely talented poetry performers taking to the stage in the Wesley Hall at Truro Methodist Church. There were 14 pupils from Prep, who received feedback from the adjudicator Eleanor Mcleod that was both laudatory and constructive. Their performances were polished from the moment they introduced themselves to how they performed and then thanked all the people involved. They were courteous, confident performers who were a credit to themselves and the Prep School. Well done to all of our speakers; Florence, Tilda, Hugo, Sophie, Sylvie, Mia, Gracie, Niamh, Atti, Logan, Dylan, Penny, Ellie and Jenny.

On Wednesday, the Prep Orchestra, directed by Mr MacQuarrie, took part in the Junior Schools Instrumental Ensemble competition for the first time. They performed their three pieces ('Theme Tune to the Muppets', 'An Dufunyans' and 'Theme' from Handel's 'Water Music') beautifully and looked and sounded very slick and polished. All players had put in a huge amount of time and effort after school in rehearsals leading up to this event.

On Thursday, the Prep Choir, consisting of 37 singers in Years 5 and 6, took part in two competitions. Directed by Ms Renshaw, and accompanied by one of our piano teachers Mr Carne, the choir competed in two classes: the Hymn and Folk Song class (singing 'I the Lord of Sea and Sky' and' Nine Brave Boys', a Cornish folk song arranged by Ms Renshaw) followed by the Junior Schools Choral class (singing 'Stars' and 'Icarus').

The choir sang extremely well; they were confident and clear, with lots of lovely expression and good technique. The adjudicator commented that they performed, "as one with many voices working together". Truro School Prep was placed first in both classes and presented with two shields, one of which is a beautiful copper shield dating back to 1915. This was the first time the choir had competed in this festival since 2018 and so it was a pleasing return to this type of occasion.

We would like to say a huge well done to all of the pupils from Prep who worked so hard this week. We will share the full results from Truro School and more photos online in the early part of next week. Thanks to all of the staff who made this week possible.







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Morning Routines in Pre-Prep

Mornings at Pre-Prep are carefully crafted to create opportunities for developing key social skills and to ready our youngest pupils for a day of learning.

Every morning, families are greeted by the Heads of Pre-Prep, allowing them to check in and share any updates before the children head off to Willday House.

In KS1, the children are given some important social time while others read with adults. This time helps to support the development of listening, sharing and problem-solving skills and allows our children to regulate their emotions and relationships with other children.

They are then ready for their more structured morning activities including phonics four times a week and handwriting or targeted intervention activities for every child in Year 2.

In Reception, the day also starts with some social time before pupils move on to daily mindfulness sessions. This calms the pupils and prepares them for their day of learning, starting with a rotation of subjects including phonics, Maths, Spanish, Music, Forest School, swimming or PE.





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Prep Open Morning

We were delighted to welcome a large number of families to our annual Prep Open Morning.

The site was buzzing with activity, offering a range of exciting experiences around the campus. Girls and boys had the chance to test their computer skills, unleash their creativity in our art room, and engage in hands-on science experiments.


A heartfelt thank you to all of the pupils and parents who volunteered their time, as well as to everyone who joined us for the day.

British Science Week

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
Year 3 House Swimming Gala

Bereavement and Serious Illness

In times of grief, the support and understanding we offer our children can profoundly shape their emotional well-being and resilience.

Loss is an inevitable part of life, and children, like adults, experience profound sorrow when faced with the death of a loved one. However, they may lack the emotional vocabulary and coping mechanisms to articulate their feelings effectively.

By fostering open communication, empathy, and understanding, we can empower our children to navigate through their sorrow and emerge stronger from their experiences.

Penhaligon's Friends is an organisation which is available to support those children and young people who have experienced the death of someone special who was close to them. They can also help if someone special has received a serious illness diagnosis.

All the helpers have had special training to enable them to support you if are grieving the loss of someone you loved. They do this through a variety of activities.

All the helpers are used to working with children in a range of settings and are very committed to making sure that they offer you the best support they can. They will usually come to visit you in your home or school, wherever you feel most comfortable, to tell you about our special days and to find out more about how you may be feeling.

Make your poster




