As a result, I accidently changed careers.

A few years later, I relocated to Oakville, a town on the shore of Lake Ontario close to Toronto.

A few years after that, I bumped into Chris 'Bill' Bishop, of the class of '61, who had been our troop leader when I was in the Scouts. Neither of us had known the other was in Canada, much less living in the same town. Chris too was working with computers. We've become fast friends.

Marking Remembrance Day on November 11th, Jo Wood, Truro School Archivist, has supplied some poignant reminders for our reflection.





John P James

(TS 1910-1912)

died 26 October 1916

Joined the 6th Bt. Oxford & Buckinghamshire Light Infantry as a private and worked as a tunneller in the trenches.



Reginald S Gill

(TS 1895-1897)

died 6 November 1916

Served with the 8th Bt. (Service) Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry in Greece.

W. Arthur Lawry

(TS 1909-1910)

died 11 November 1916

Land surveyor who joined the 110th Siege Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery, in 1915 and arrived in France in May 1916.

An unknown writer, in the December 1916 school magazine, noted that:

Yesterday the Germans were sweeping our area, and a shell entered the dug-out where he was taking dinner with three friends, killing instantaneously Arthur and two others, and badly wounding the fourth ... He was respected and loved by the men of the Battery, and all who came in contact with him felt that he was a fine man, earnest, generous in sympathy, charitable to a fault.

Norman Rundell (CO39) Three Rundell Boys

Norman Rundell kindly submitted a piece recalling his attendance at Truro School along with two his brothers, Ivor and Kenneth. Ken was awarded the Military Cross.

The citation reading: "Lt Rundell showed complete disregard for personal danger and his determination and courage were an outstanding example to his men."


